Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Greetings from all at Tymawr.

What a glorious summer we have had - yes, not enough water for the earth, but nonetheless abundance in other ways. The plum trees are dripping; the meadows have been covered with a mist of butterflies; the apple trees are laden. Such a contrast to the tragic state of our world, where others are starving and being dispossessed at every level of their being. Violation of the body of God's people and the created environment. We are members of this very body and it is we who are both the cause and object of the suffering.

Over the past few months I have been so aware of the Body of the Community. As you all know, these past months have been a time of going out and coming in. In January we moved out of the convent to Michaelgarth so that the ground source heating system and the renovations to the Guest wing might be accomplished. The four months at Michaelgarth were a blessing. Each one of us profited from the space and change in different ways. There was a gentleness about the rhythm. We watched the spring unfold before our eyes. All our senses were feasted. I think too we were able to be with each other in a new way, neither segregated by the demands of the life or the spaces of the building. What perhaps some of us had feared – the closeness - became a friend and a gift. Holy Week was led by Bishop Dominic and was also gentle. As we stood around the Easter candle at the end of Easter Day we were aware of a deep communion between us.

The beginning of May announced change: it was time to return from Michaelgarth to the convent and to open our doors to friends and strangers. The returning to the 'ordinary' was in front of us, save for the fact that we returned to only part of the building. The heating system was by and large complete. The improvements to the Guest Wing were underway, but not complete until the end of June. So that we might once more welcome guests, we decided to offer accommodation at Michaelgarth (bed and breakfast) and provide main meals in the refectory. The Chapel has remained in use throughout. Nonetheless, the move back into the convent demanded enormous amounts of cleaning and re-organising... a big 'thank you' must go to Companion Neil for the innumerable hours of window cleaning, hoovering, furniture moving and curtain hanging. By the middle of July, we were finally ready to welcome guests back into the guest wing of the convent, now equipped with new showers, toilets and kitchenette.

The BIG project is more or less complete. What seemed daunting and impossible two years ago, has been achieved. We have been blessed with a good team of professionals: MJS Energy for the ground source, William Powell Building contractors for the Guest Wing work, SolarSense for the solar panel array and Graham Frecknall Architects. A big 'thank you' too, must go to Revd. Jean Prosser, our chaplain, who has attentively and rigorously managed and overseen all this work. Thank you. We are grateful to those who lent us 'stop-gap money' whilst we negotiated the sale of the barns. Our new neighbours, a family with two children, are now getting ready to move in. Thank you to all who contributed money for the execution of this project and who trusted that it would happen!

Whilst all that work was germinating over the last two years, so too was a final commitment. On June 7th we had the joy of celebrating the solemn vows of Sr. Joanna Ruth. Whilst Ruth is already Sr. Joanna's baptismal name. she chose to include it in her religious name because the story of Ruth and Naomi was significant in her discernment and her commitment to Jesus, in this place, under this Rule and with these women. Sr. Joanna Ruth was radiant on the day and her radiance penetrated all our hearts so that the day was full of light and joy. Given her first profession had been circumscribed by Covid, this celebration was celebrated by people from all stages of her life journey, making for a big

crowd! We are thankful for God's fidelity to Tymawr in bringing forth new life and we walk trusting that His Will be fulfilled in this place.

A week later the community gathered again and welcomed Megan as she made her first commitment to an exploration of a life here at Tymawr. She was clothed on the 13th June. This too was a joyous occasion.

Since the doors of the community opened once more, we have not stopped welcoming old and new friends. In June we also hosted the Oblates' retreat led by Bishop Robert Attwell. The retreat ended with the Oblation of Sharon Roberts and the renewal of their commitment by all the Oblates present. The



theme of the retreat was 'Recalibrating the Heart'. The days were thick with prayer and sharing. Then on the feast of Saints Peter and Paul we welcomed Anne Griffith as an Associate of the community. The Associates gathered on Zoom in June for fellowship and the exchange of news. All of this was another experience of the Body of Christ present here within the community.

Amongst our many guests over these last three months, we welcomed four ordinands from Llandaff diocese who made their pre-ordination retreat at Michaelgarth. Whilst they were in silence and had their own programme, the fact that they came to worship with us in the chapel created a bond between us. We hope that they will return to this particular well over the years to come. Several 'cell' groups have come to stay in the convent and Michaelgarth this summer, each relaying how nourishing the space was for them. Whilst the groups staying with the community are very diverse, ranging from retreats to circle dance groups, all are fed. Offering this living space is a way that we can undergird the life and work of the Church and be a part of Christ's work of reconciliation in the world.

It has been a joy to welcome Alongsider Claire (for nine months), Ali for five weeks whist she undertook a 30-day retreat (whilst attending the Offices and doing the laundry!!!), and now we have Amanda with us for four weeks and Sylvia for six weeks. Each person brings their story, their gifts and their hopes . . . And we have been pleased to welcome back Edi, Beth and Heather who lived Alongside last autumn. It is good to hear the ongoing story of their journey with Christ.

In July, the community inclusive of Oblates and Associates made a pilgrimage to the Shrine of St David with + Rowan - an Icon of St. David and the writings of Walter Hilton (+1395). This was a deep and moving experience journeying to Jerusalem within our hearts, and experiencing the beauty of St David's with our bodies! Once more I was struck by the density of prayer over the three days we had together.



"Spiritually interpreted, Jerusalem is the vision of peace, and symbolises contemplation in the perfect love of God. For contemplation is nothing other than the vision of Jesus, who is our true Peace. ...

The beginning of this high road that you must travel is reformation in faith, which, as I have already said, is grounded in humility, faith, and the laws of the church. .. If you wish to make swift and substantial progress along this road, you must constantly bear in mind two things, humility and love. That is, I am nothing, and I only want one thing. ... Humility says, 'I am nothing, I have nothing.' Love says, 'I desire one thing only, which is Jesus.' When deftly touched by the finger of reason, these two strings, secured by the thought of Jesus, make sweet harmony in the harp of the soul, for the lower you strike on one, the higher the sound on the other. Under the influence of humility, the less you feel that you are or possess, the greater will be your love and longing for Jesus. I am not speaking merely of the kind of humility that a soul feels at the sight of its own sin or weakness, or of the sorrows of this life, or when it sees the better lives of other Christians; for although this kind of humility is sound and wholesome, it is still of an elementary and worldly type, not pure, gentle, and perfect. I am speaking rather of the humility that a soul feels by grace as it contemplates the infinite Being and wondrous goodness of Jesus.... This is perfect humility, for in comparison to Jesus, who is All, you are nothing. You should also realise that you possess nothing, like a vessel that stands empty, incapable of filling itself; for however many good works you perform, spiritual or bodily, you have nothing until you feel the love of Jesus within you. . It is this precious liquor alone that can fill your soul, and no other. And since this alone is so precious and noble, you must realise that whatever you may have or achieve is of no value or satisfaction without the love of Jesus. Put everything else behind you and forget it; only then can you have what is best of all." Walter Hilton (+1395) The Ladder of Perfection trans. The hedges planted four years ago are beginning to have real body around the estate.

Next week we shall welcome 30 religious from all over Europe attending a biannual Interdenominational conference, hosted by SSC. This is exciting for us and promises to be interesting...more anon.
